
Fact Sheet: Sudden Unexpected Infant Death (SUID)

Every year in the United States, more than 3,500 infant deaths are classified as SUID.¹



Did you know?

SUID cases represent **14.3%** of all infant deaths in Louisiana.²


Many SUIDs are determined to be accidental suffocation and strangulation (ASSB) upon further investigation.



Definitions of SUID and SIDS:

Sudden Unexplained Infant Death (SUID) is not a cause of death. It is defined as the death of an infant who is less than 1 year of age that is sudden and unexpected with no obvious cause.

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS) is a type of SUID. It is defined as the unexpected death of an infant less than 1 year of age that cannot be explained even after a thorough investigation has been conducted.
